Year In Review

This Year Kakivak has funded many opportunities for beneficiaries of the Qikiqtani region. Here are some of the highlights!

- Over \$55,000 spent to support the development of the arts at the Northern Lights Conference and Cultural Showcase. Kakivak supported the "Art Showcase" at this largest northern focused business conference and cultural showcase in Canada.
- Our new career centres in Iqaluit and throughout the communities in the region provide an opportunity for our clients to search for new employment, develop employment related skills, update resumes and get career counseling. With the anticipated increase in resource development in the region and the resulting employment opportunities we expect to be quite busy!
- Our work with partners such as Human Resources and Skills Development Canada and the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency continued to allow us to maximize the opportunities for Qikiqtani beneficiaries.
- 68% of the funding Kakivak receives is directly delivered to clients.



NunaVet

Kakivak's role in the success of one entrepreneur.

Leia Cunningham wanted to be a vet since she was a little girl. Seeing how her hometown of Iqaluit was without year round veterinary care, she dreamed of making a difference for her home community. Making that dream a reality would take the work of many people. Kakivak was forefront in Leia's success. Through the Training Department, Kakiyak provided funding for Leia's education. Once she was a fully certified vet, Kakivak again helped Leia through support provided by the Business Department. This gave Leia the opportunity to open NunaVet, Igaluit's full service mobile vet clinic. Thanks to the partnership with Leia and Kakivak, Igaluit's pets have an opportunity to receive quality care, and Leia has the opportunity to run a successful business in her home community.

Business Development

Kakivak's Business Development Officers can help you determine the best combination of funding and financing options for your business. We offer a number of programs to help businesses succeed, including:

Makigiaqvik Loans

If you're operating an Inuit owned business you could qualify for up to \$50,000 in financing through the Makigiaqvik Loans Program. This can help you establish or expand a business.

Sivummut Grants to Small Business

Sivummut Grants can be used for business pre-start up, start up or business expansion.

Small Tools Grant

Small Tools Grants are one of our most popular programs. These grants can be used to assist with the purchase of carving tools or sewing machines.

Economic Opportunities Fund

Tourism related businesses that are operating in the six communities adjacent to the National Parks in the region can apply for up to \$10,000 in funding through the Economic Opportunities Fund.



Unique Opportunities

Kakivak Association's business development department is pleased to have provided some unique opportunities for business in the Qikiqtani region this year. Highlights include:

- Nunavut Arts and Crafts Association festival
- Training for 7 photographers operating small businesses as part of a photography workshop held in Arctic Bay.
- Wilderness First Aid provided for tourism related businesses.
- Continued partnership with Nunavut CEDO and the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency.

Partnering for Success

Successful businesses require partnerships just like Kakivak depends on partnerships with other agencies providing support to businesses. We work closely with agencies that play a key role in the success of Qikiqtani businesses. We work with organizations like the Baffin Business Development Corporation, Atuqtuarvik, Nunavut Business Credit Corporation, the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency and many others. Our partnerships mean Qikiqtani businesses have a strong team ready to help them achieve success.




Meet James...

Opportunity

Childcare, Youth and Disability

The Childcare Youth & Disability Department of Kakivak offers a number of programs specifically targeted to these groups. Together with our partners, we are able to deliver four key programs.

- The Childcare Program offers support in three areas, basic operations and maintenance, attendance-based support, and support for cultural training and equipment.
- The Career Promotion & Awareness and the Summer Student Employment Opportunity Programs support development and enhancement of essential job related skills and expose students to a variety of career options.
- The Mentored and Information & Communications Technology Work
 Placements Program supports youth mentored work experiences, career planning and counseling activities. It also supports life and work experience and skills development to youth.
- The Disability Assistance Program
 enables participants to acquire additional
 employment skills needed to adapt
 to workplace changes as result of
 technological or market changes.

Our departmental highlights for this year included:

A three-day long youth conference in Iqaluit that focused on careers and entrepreneurship attracted over 20 youth from all across the Qikiqtani region. This was an opportunity for youth to learn how to develop entrepreneurial skills.

Students in Pond Inlet were treated to a Science Camp thanks to Elephant Thoughts, an Ontario based science camp service. Students had a chance to take part in workshops that included a mentorship program so community members can deliver the camps in the future as well.

Kakivak sponsored three students to participate in the 2011 expedition of Students on Ice. Thanks to the Science and Technology Program, the three students, along with the other 74 participants visited Iceland, Greenland and Nunavut where they interacted with community members and dignitaries while learning about the different cultures in each location.

The Summer Work Experience Program and the Youth Training and Employment Program found employment & training for over 70 youth between ages 15 – 30 in 2011-12. Kakivak delivers these two programs on behalf of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development and Human Resources and Skills Development Canada.


Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami established the Inuit Early Childhood Development Working Group in 2001 to support the development of Inuit Early Childhood development. Kakivak sits on this committee to represent Qikiqtanimiut and have been actively involved in the group since the beginning. The Early Childhood Development Working Group develops strategies to inform leaders, influence policies

and work collaboratively to ensure Inuit children have access to quality, appropriate and reliable development services. This year marked the 10th anniversary of this group; Kakivak is pleased to be part of such a successful partnership and looks forward to continuing to work with ITK and the other partners on this.



Meet Hanna...

Hanna Kilabuk has been the childcare and disability project officer with Kakivak for over 10 years. She finds it rewarding to deliver the programs that provide such valuable services to these two groups. Hanna is the person who prepares the applications as they come in and tries to identify linkages between Kakivak's programs and the needs of the clients. She always likes to hear from the communities!



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Training and Employment

At Kakivak we know training and employment are essential to the success of Qikiqtani beneficiaries. This is why we offer the following programs to help our clients find employment:

- The Individual Sponsorship Program
 helps beneficiaries gain skills by supporting
 those enrolled in employment training
 programs. Through this program allowances,
 tuition and travel support may be provided.
- Community Service Project Funding is the best fit for not-for-profits, Inuit organizations and municipal governments. If these groups are offering employment or work experiences for Inuit then funding up to \$25,000 may be provided.
- If you are an employer hiring Inuit you can qualify for wage subsidies for a 12 – 48 week period through the Wage Subsidy Program.
- Wage subsidies and costs related to job mentoring are eligible expenses for a 12-48 week period when applying to the Employment Related Training funds. In addition, training can be funded through this program.

Highlights

- In 2011-12, Kakivak supported eight organizations with over \$1.6 million.
 This allowed over 185 clients to be trained throughout the region.
- The Individual Sponsorship Program supported 168 individuals around the region.
- Through the Employment Related Training Program, Kakivak supported the training of four Heavy Equipment Operators at Northwest Transport & Heavy Equipment Training centre. Kakivak staff and board members had the opportunity to visit these trainees on site in January.
- Kakivak Staff also undertook training so they can better serve their clients.
 In March the department completed the Career Development Practitioners Training.



Meet Carol...

Carol Akeeagok has been part of Kakivak team for over two years. Carol is responsible for assisting individual clients with the Individual Sponsorship Applications. Carol is the person most our clients meet with or talk to on the phone when they are filling out the application forms. It's important that these forms be filled out accurately. Partnerships

Delivering quality training to ensure hamlet workers have the skills necessary to do their jobs is no easy task. Yet the Municipal Training Organization has the mandate to identify, develop and implement programs to ensure workers across the territory can deliver for their communities. Kakivak is pleased to partner with Municipal Training Organization to fund training courses, fund individuals to take training and provide wage subsidies within the Qikiqtani Region.



Success Story

Ilisaqsivik Society

The Ilisaqsivik Society in Clyde River is no stranger to Kakivak's opportunities. For at least eight years, they have accessed training and employment funds through the Community Service Project to provide on the job training. In 2011-12, funding was secured to support a digital media and film position and an administrative assistant. For many years, this funding has also been used to develop the skills of the trainees so they can then obtain a position fulltime. Often times, the trainee will develop such strong skills that they move on to work with another employer at a position they were not qualified for previously. Jakob Gearhead, executive director of Ilisagsivik Society doesn't take it personally when a trainee moves on. He is proud his organization gives many people their first job in Clyde River.

"People cut their teeth with us and we're proud of the foundation we can provide, thanks to Kakivak's support."






Career Services

In 2011-12 Kakivak added a new service to their programs by opening Employment Resource Centres. These centres are equipped with computers, resource materials and the helpful staff our clients need to help develop their job search skills. These centres are delivered by Kakivak on behalf of Human Resources and Skills Development Canada. The Employment Resource Centres have a Job Board and a Training & Opportunities Board that are easily accessible for the public.

The Employment Resource Centres are open to anyone who is unemployed, under-employed, or looking for a career change. The centres provide materials and resources to help individuals through every step of the job search process including:

- Resume writing
- Cover letter writing
- Interview skills and preparation
- Job search skills and techniques
- Free printing, faxing, and photocopying
- Access to job board and training information
- Complete employment resource library



The computers are equipped with current resume and cover letter writing software, as well as a program to assist individuals in improving their typing skills. We also offer guidance in training and skills enhancement for individuals who are looking to return to school. There is the main centre located at the Kakivak office in Iqaluit, and there are 12 satellite centres providing services in every community in the Qikiqtani region. Assistance is provided by Community Liaison Officers to clients in the other communities. We will be expanding the services and resources in these centres during the upcoming year.

Farah's knowledge on resume writing, cover letters, job search and interview tips are useful to young people just starting their job search and older clients who are looking to update their skills.

Financial Summary

Kakivak Association delivers a large number of training and employment programs, business loans and grants, childcare, afterschool and youth programs.

In 2011-12, 68% of Kakivak's total spending went directly to clients — over \$6.1 million. This is an increase of over \$448,000 from 2010-11.


At the same time, our operating costs totaled \$2,427,024. This is \$248,036 lower than the previous year's operating cost of \$2,675,060.

Human Resources and Skills Development Canada, under a 5-year agreement with Kakivak Association, provides \$6,170,813 for training and childcare for Qikiqtani beneficiaries.

2 AANDC

Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada provides Kakivak Association with funding for youth employment and career promotion programs. Our 2011-12 agreement was \$642,614.

3 CanNor

CanNor provides Kakivak Association funding for community economic development. Under our 2011-12 agreement with CanNor, Kakivak Association received \$1,115,084.

4 QIA

Qikiqtani Inuit Association. In 2011-12 Kakivak received \$906,856 for community economic development and traditional training.

5 Other

Interest and other income. \$570, 955 was received from rent and admin recovery and from interest on investments.

Notes:

The summarized statement of operations presented above and the summarized statement of financial position were compiled from Kakivak Association's 2011-12 audited financial statements.

Kakivak Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting. Our General Fund accounts for Kakivak's general operating and administrative activities. This fund reports contributions from CanNor, interest and other income, investments in property and equipment, and has mostly unrestricted resources.

The Training Fund reports only restricted funds that are to be used for training and employment of Inuit beneficiaries in the Qikiqtani region. The Daycare Fund also reports only restricted funds that are to be used for childcare and afterschool programs for Inuit beneficiaries in the Qikiqtani Region. These funds normally balance to zero at the end of the year as all funds are disbursed.

Funding for Kakivak's Training Fund and Daycare Fund comes from the Government of Canada, Human Resources and Skills Development Canada department.

The Economic Opportunities Fund is made up of restricted funds that are to be used for tourism related economic and business development opportunities in communities adjacent to Qikiqtani national parks.

The Makigiaqvik Loan Fund and Sivummut Grant Fund report restricted funds used to provide business loans and grants to Qikiqtani beneficiaries. Capitalization for these funds come from The Qikiqtani Inuit Association and from loan and fund interest.

The AANDC Projects Fund reports only restricted funds from Government of Canada department of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada. It is to be used only for youth employment programs for Qikiqtani beneficiaries.
