




From our office in Iqaluit,
Kakivak Association serves Inuit
in the thirteen communities that
make up the Qikiqtani Region
of Nunavut. Our region is large,
stretching 2,200 kilometres from
Sanikiluaq in south-east Hudson
Bay to Grise Fiord on Ellesmere
Island. Our communities are
diverse, ranging from Iqaluit,
the territorial capital with a
population close to 8,000, to
Grise Fiord in the high Arctic
with a population of 150.



Our priorities at Kakivak include:

- Providing financial support for Inuit pursuing training and postsecondary education.
- Supporting Inuit in achieving employment objectives through job search and employment assistance services.
- Assisting Inuit in achieving greater participation in business through the establishment, management and operation of viable, successful businesses.

- Offering support for work experience and skills development for Inuit youth, leading to advancement in education and employment.
- Supporting adequate and affordable access to childcare as a basis for increased participation of Inuit, and particularly Inuit women, in education, training and employment.
- Delivering high quality, professional services to clients.

- Strengthening partnerships with a wide range of individuals, businesses and organizations.
- Developing Kakivak
 Association as an effective and efficient organization for the delivery of community economic development programs and services.

PRESIDENT AND CEO LEONIE QAUMARIAQ

For the second time, we are presenting our annual report while the world is still grappling with a corona virus pandemic. This is a unique situation for us, and for everyone that we work with and serve in our region. The pandemic has had a large negative impact on all service organizations and our clients, most notably small businesses, daycares, and post-secondary students.

After our offices were closed to the public in March of 2020, we suddenly had to figure out how to operate and continue to serve the changing needs of our clients. A priority was the continuation of our existing childcare programs and support to students who were far from home dealing with isolation and lockdowns and an uncertain academic future.

Another priority was to see what we could do to support our clients who were adversely affected by the pandemic lockdowns and travel restrictions. In April, only a few weeks after the first lockdown was announced, we successfully launched the Qikiqtani COVID-19 Business Relief and

Qikiqtani COVID-19 Emergency Wage Subsidy Programs, making available new programing of up to \$1.5 Million in support to the smallest, most vulnerable Inuitowned businesses and employers in the Qikiqtani Region.

In the middle of all of this, the launch of the Inuit Post-Secondary Education Strategy took place in the Spring of 2020. This federally funded program expanded and enhanced the support for Inuit Students living and studying outside of Inuit Nunangat. We were able to provide support for over 70 students with connections to the Qikiqtani region.

All through the pandemic, our staff faced numerous challenges as well. We had to learn to work differently, with Zoom and MS
Teams calls replacing face to
face interactions. Schools and
Daycare closures combined with
Office closures led to a shift to
working from home and balancing
family and work life in novel and
sometimes stressfull circumstances.
Parents become part time teachers
as well as remote workers.

I am very proud of our staff and what we have been able to accomplish in one of the most difficult years in our history.

COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE

On March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization announced that COVID-19 was a Global Pandemic. Our first priority was for our clients and during the following week Kakivak moved quickly to support the individuals, businesses and organizations that depended on Kakivak Association for financial support.

OUR FIRST RESPONSES INCLUDED:

- Advancing six months of funding for daycare centres
- Notifying students that they would still receive their approved funding for living expenses, even if their classes were cancelled
- Providing initial relief to businesses by postponing loan payments

With the support of the Qikiqtani Inuit Association, Kakivak Association rolled out new programs to assist businesses, non-profit organizations and students to help reduce the negative impacts of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Over \$1.5 million was approved through these programs, including operational support for 33 Inuit-owned businesses, helping to maintain employment for 77 Inuit and emergency assistance for 21 Inuit students and their families.

- The Qikiqtani Covid-19 Business Relief Program was created to provide direct support for small Inuit-owned businesses that were forced to close or had significant reductions in revenue due to the pandemic. Over \$437,000 in funding was approved through this program.
- The Qikiqtani Covid-19 Wage Subsidy and Training Program was created to help employers keep Inuit employed. Over \$980,000 in funding was approved through this program.
- The Qikiqtani Covid-19 Student Relief Program was created to provide support for post-secondary education students with unplanned expenses due to the pandemic. Over \$160,000 in funding was approved through this program.

APPRECIATION FOR CLEANER AIR!

As part of our Covid-19 response, Kakivak Association provided Jade medical grade air purifiers to 22 childcare centres in the Qikiqtani Region.

The Jade air purifiers have multiple layers of filtration and germicidal ultraviolet lights, and are proven to remove airborne odours, bacteria and viruses. To assist with continued operation, each purifier was shipped with a three-year supply of replacement filters and ultraviolet bulbs.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Kakivak's Business Development Officers can help with business planning and to determine the best options available to finance a business startup or expansion. We offer a number of programs and services to help your business succeed.

SMALL TOOLS GRANTS

Small Tools Grants is our most popular program. These grants can be used to assist with the purchase of carving tools or sewing machines.

SIVUMMUT GRANTS TO SMALL BUSINESS

Sivummut Grants can be used to support the establishment or expansion of viable Inuit-owned businesses.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES FUND

The Economic Opportunities Fund can provide grants of up to \$10,000 for the startup or expansion of tourismbased businesses in the 6 communities adjacent to the National Parks in the Qikiqtani Region.

MAKIGIAQVIK LOANS

The Makigiaqvik Loans
Program can provide loans
of up to \$50,000 for eligible
Inuit-owned businesses. These
loans can be used to startup or expand a business.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

This program provides contributions to support the startup and expansion of eligible Inuit-owned businesses. Kakivak delivers this program through an agreement with the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency.

BUSINESS CAPACITY AND STARTUP FUND

The Business Capacity and Startup Fund is available to assist new and existing businesses operating in the communities included in the Mary River Inuit Impact Benefits Agreement. Kakivak delivers this program through an agreement with the Qikiqtani Inuit Association.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE...

Near the end of 2020, Kakivak started work to create a new business training program to help Inuit-owned businesses understand and prepare for government procurement opportunities. This project was initiated in partnership with the Kitikmeot and Kivalliq Inuit Associations, and supported by Indigenous Services Canada. The delivery of this training program will begin in the fall of 2021.

PARTNERING FOR SUCCESS

Over the past 6 years Kakivak Association has had two, three-year agreements with CanNor for the delivery of their Entrepreneurship and Business Development program. Near the end of the year Kakivak submitted a proposal to renew this agreement for 5 years. This effort was successful and a new agreement was effective April 1, 2021. Kakivak's delivery of this program has helped small Inuit-owned businesses access over \$4.1 million in federal funding to support almost \$19 million of total project costs.

ELIZABETH HELPED ME TO GET A SEWING MACHINE

Elizabeth Murray has worked in the Business Department since March 2020. As the Small Tools Program Support Clerk her primary role is to support clients who are submitting applications to Kakivak's Small Tools Program.

Elizabeth loves to sew, cook and bake. She also loves to travel and tries to spend some time with some of her family in Nunavik when she can.



KAKIVAK DELIVERS RELIEF TO BUSINESSES IMPACTED BY COVID-19

When the Covid-19 Pandemic began it immediately became clear that small Inuit-owned businesses were going to need some assistance to survive the loss of revenue as business closures and other restrictions were imposed.

With the support of the Qikiqtani Inuit Association Kakivak Association was able to respond quickly by launching the Qikiqtani Covid-19 Business Relief Program and the Qikiqtani Covid-19 Wage Subsidy and Training Program. Up to March 31, 2021 over \$437,000 in direct business relief and \$980,000 in wage subsidy and training funds were delivered under these programs.



SUMMER SCIENCE CAMP

Kakivak provided support to Polar Outfitting to provide a five-day summer science camp to provide traditional knowledge to Inuit youth.

Participants learned about the anatomy of Arctic Char, fish environment and ecosystems, fisheries development, sustainable harvesting, and traditional safe food handling and preparation.


KAKIVAK DELIVERS SUPPORT FOR INUIT EARLY LEARNING AND CHILDCARE

Kakivak has been providing funding to childcare centres for over 25 years. Over the past 5 years, additional supports and investments have been made available through enhanced program arrangements with Employment and Social Development Canada and the Qikiqtani Inuit Association. As a result, the level of funding for childcare has almost doubled from \$1.5 million to \$2.9 million.

Kakivak childcare funding includes financial support for general operations, wage subsidies for Inuit staff and subsidies for Inuit parents. In 2020-21 funding was also made available to assist with health and safety issues related to the Covid-19 pandemic.

During the year Kakivak also initiated projects to help determine the condition of childcare facilities in the region, to supply urgent health

and safety items including medical grade air purifiers, personal protective equipment and sanitizing supplies.

TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT

At Kakivak Association we know training and education are essential for success in employment and career development, this is why we offer the following programs:

- The Individual Sponsorship Program provides the financial support required for Inuit to be successful in pursuing training and post-secondary education.
- The Wage Subsidy Program assists employers hiring Inuit by providing wage subsidies.
- Employment Related Training provides funding for wage subsidies to support job mentoring and training on the job initiatives.

A SENSE OF ACCOMPLISHMENT

Annie Alexander is the Manager, Training & Employment. She manages funding programs to support post-secondary students, individual training and training projects. Annie joined Kakivak Association in 2001, and she will soon celebrate her 20th anniversary with the organization.

In 2020-21 Annie and her team delivered close to \$3.9 million through the Training and Employment programs, supporting 359 students and training participants.

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE...

INUIT POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION PROGRAM

Announced in June 2020, The Inuit Post-Secondary Education Program lays the groundwork for equity in post-secondary education for Inuit. It sets an ambitious goal to double the number of Inuit graduates of PSE programs over the next 10 years.

In pursuit of this goal, four main action areas have been identified: increased direct financial support for Inuit students; increased in-direct supports including counselling and tutoring; community engagement to promote post-secondary education; and, national coordination to monitor student success.


This new programming also provided equitable access for Inuit who live outside of Inuit Nunangat, allowing them to apply for funding through organizations based in their home regions. In the first year of delivery of the Inuit Post-Secondary Education Program Kakivak Association funded 72 students.



PARTNERING FOR SUCCESS

Kakivak Association supported Qikiqtani Industry Ltd. and their project partners, the Nunavut Construction Corporation, the Government of Nunavut, the NWT & Nunavut Construction Association and Habitat for Humanity Iqaluit.

Twenty participants participated in a 14-week pre-trades program including classroom and hand-on training. The program was designed as an entry into the construction trades, helping to increase the number of Inuit that have the basic skills required to continue their education in the trades and to work on construction projects.






FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Kakivak Association delivers a range of programs that support training and employment, childcare, youth initiatives and business development. Over the past 5 years Kakivak's program spending has totalled over \$ 35.0 million dollars, averaging over \$ 7.0 million per year. This year 67% of total expenditures went directly to our clients, totalling over \$ 8.2 million dollars.

PROGRAM SPENDING & OPERATING COSTS 2020-2021






Kakivak Fund Balances March 31, 2021

ESDC

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) for delivery of programs and services under the Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Strategy (ISETS). Through this agreement Kakivak provides funding and services related to education, training, career development and childcare programs. The total funding in 2020-21 was \$9,646,859.

QIA

Kakivak Association is the non-profit economic development arm of the Qikiqtani Inuit Association (QIA) which contributes funding to support the delivery of business and community economic development programs and services. This funding supports operations, business development programs and a childcare subsidy. The total funding for 2020-21 was \$1,481,047.

NTI

Kakivak Association has a new funding relationship with Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated to support the delivery of the Inuit Post Secondary Education Program. This program provides financial support and wrap-around services for Inuit post-secondary students, regardless of where they reside in Canada. The funding originates with Indigenous Services Canada with national coordination provided by Inuit Tapariit Kanatami. The total funding in 2020-21 was \$1,403,234.

ISC

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) for the delivery of Youth Employment Strategy programs. Through this partnership Kakivak provides project funding through five youth employment and career awareness programs. The total funding in 2020-21 was \$880,916.

CanNor

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor) that includes funding to support the delivery of business and community economic development programs and services. The total funding in 2020-21 was \$465,049.


Other

Other revenue is derived from interest earned, unrealized gains on fund investments and other sources. The majority of this revenue is dependent on the performance of a low-risk investment portfolio and is difficult to predict from year to year. The total other revenue for 2020-21 was \$254,107.
